Course Outcomes of all the Courses:

English

On the completion of courses the students are able to:

CO1: To study and understand LSRW skills through the prescribed texts and their broader implications.

CO 2: To acquire the knowledge of Basis English Grammar and composition for developing communication skills.

CO 3: To acquire fluency in the English language and conversation.

CO4: To develop imaginative powers and figurative language through learning poetry.

English Literature

Geography
